**Piracy Hurts Everyone Both Online and Offline** 

by Rep. Edolphus Towns

The writer gives an ethical reason, or a reason why the claim is the moral thing to do.

... The rush to make all content available online ... has real world consequences. These consequences ... affect small urban record stores, rural used booksellers, and other retailers.... These are small businesses that provide jobs in my community, ... and theft ... affects the ability of these small business owners to exist. I have a serious problem with that.

This sentence gives a statistic to provide support for the claim.

Notice the emotional language.

## Focus Strategy ► Synthesize

When you read persuasive writing about a particular issue, it is a good idea to read the argument of more than one writer. You can evaluate each writer's argument and compare evidence across texts to gain a greater understanding of the issue.

- 2. Determine your own understanding based on your evaluation of both writers' works.
